Philips MiraVision and Ad Notam's Mirror TVs

For TV-addicted narcissists everywhere, Philips has a gold-framed wall mirror (below) with inset TVs (\$2,500–\$5,500) that appear with crystal clarity when activated. The Ad Notam company specializes in TV screens custom-made to fit into any glass surface, such as windows and mirrors. At left is an Ad Notam screen placed in a vanity-type mirror with a shelf.



Philips Streamium 23" FlatTV

The \$2,999 Streamium has a built-in wireless feature so you can watch video and audio beamed from your notebook or desktop PC.

Sharp AQUOS and Sony LocationFree TV

Wireless has been the word in computers for a while, and TV is about to catch up. Sharp and Sony are leading the charge. Sharp already offers the 15" **AQUOS LC-15LIU-S** (\$1,799, below), while Sony will release two sets this fall: the 12.1" **LF-X1** (\$1,499) and the 7" **LF-X5** (\$999, both above). All three models work the same: Plug your cable box/DVD player and broadband modem into the TV's base station, and you're free to move the rechargeable monitor anywhere around the house. While the Sharp screen is bigger, its slower connection speed could cause some stuttering. The Sonys have built-in Web browsers so you can, say, call up that recipe from FoodTV.com while watching the Food Network.



And you can do it from your neighborhood Wi-Fi-friendly café: Just log into your home network and get with the program.
